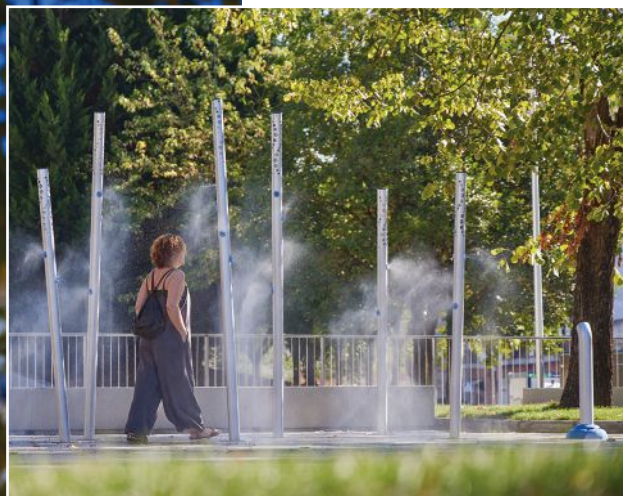

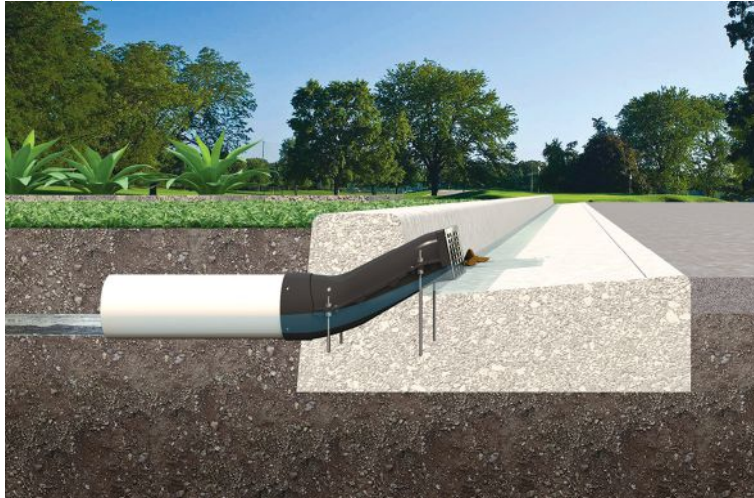

● **THE STRATAFLOW KERB INLET**

The Strataflow Kerb Inlet manages stormwater while helping trees grow. The sloped design guides the water away from the roadway and lets it permeate the adjacent garden and tree pits. The front grate blocks pollutants while allowing cleaner water to enter, and multiple units can be installed to increase capacity. ●
